JOAN JAECKEL BIO 2023

Joan Jaeckel is the consulting producer of Eric Stacey's award winning documentary <u>The Waldorf Promise: Children Who Love to Learn Become Students Who Achieve.</u> The film helped establish the then-just-sprouting <u>movement for Waldorf education in US public schools.</u> She was instrumental in founding <u>Ocean Charter School</u>, the first Waldorf-inspired school within the Los Angeles Unified School District (LAUSD), as well as its sister charter school <u>El Rio Community School</u>.



Through The Source School / Los Angeles, today she gathers educators from organic/spiritually-inspired/whole-child schools and traditional public schools to prototype generative ways of collaborating with colleagues and students - to hear "what the future wants." We are prototyping "Creating Cultures of Connection" using <u>Theory U</u>, awareness-based deep-listening games for systemic change developed by <u>Otto Scharmer</u>, who is Senior Lecturer at <u>MIT</u> and founding chair of the <u>Presencing Institute</u>.

Along the way Joan has worked with leading figures in the movement to transform education from authoritarian to holistic in the US.

For example she produced a three-day invitational symposium, "Investing In Socially Responsible Education" held February 1-3, 2004 at the Presidio in San Francisco, hosted by Ron Miller and Joan Jaeckel, and funded by Newman's Own Family Foundation and the Foundation for Educational Renewal.



The invitation to participants included a white paper "Investing in Socially Responsible Education" that was prepared by Ron Miller (Author of What Are Schools For? Holistic Schools in American Culture and Editor and Publisher of Holistic Education Review, Joan Jaeckel (Consulting Producer The Waldorf Promise), and Robin Martin (Coordinator at Paths of Learning Resource Center. Jeff De Cagna (Tech Writer at Fast Company Magazine) and Harold Jordan (Senior Policy Advocate | ACLU Pennsylvania).

This event led to Joan being asked to guest-edit an issue of the Green Money Journal. Inviting Eric Utne to co-edit, they

produced an issue devoted to Investing in Socially Responsible Education.

- Joan facilitated a *KCET Life and Times Tonight* segment, "A Tale of Two Schools: Technology in the Classroom" featuring Alan C. Kay
- Joan produced, with the *Alliance for Childhood*, "The Child and the Machine" with keynote speakers Alison Armstrong, author of *The Child & the Machine*, Alan C. Kay, "father of the PC" and VP and Disney Fellow, Creative Technology at Walt Disney Imagineering, R&D.
